The Patron and Vice Patrons were re-elected.

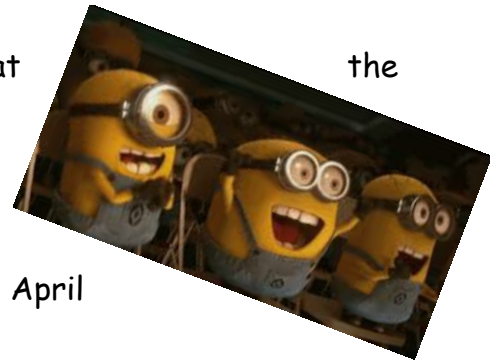
Ken Te Tau spoke of the new disabled toilet that they rallied for in the Wellington Airport.
